
WHAT IS SEXUAL TALK?

<u>Sexual talk</u> occurs **exclusively** during sex and is specific to the current activity. There are **two** types:

- Individualistic focuses on dominance & sexual fantasy.
- Mutualistic- includes exclamations of pleasure, compliments & statements of intimacy.

Sexual script theory suggests that men and women think about sex differently, establishing men as the initiators of sex and women as more concerned with emotional intimacy than pleasure.

WE WANTED TO KNOW:



WHAT WE DID:

We recruited **160** mixed-gender/sex long-term couples and conducted a **two-part** study:

Part 1: Participants completed a self-report measure about their retrospective use of sexual talk in their current relationship.





Part 2: 35-day daily diary.
Couples reported on their partnered sexual activity, including sexual talk type and frequency.

WHAT WE FOUND:

There were **no significant** gender/sex or dyad type differences in use of **individualistic** talk retrospectively *or* daily.

However,

Women retrospectively reported using more mutualistic talk than men, especially when partnered with a woman, but this was not true when reported in daily diaries.

And,

For GSD couples, there may be gender/sex & dyad type differences retrospectively & daily, for individualistic and not mutualistic talk.

Our findings were contrary to previous research, suggesting that further research is needed to understand factors which impact sexual talk type and frequency among couples.

FUTURE RESEARCH ...

- May explore how other factors may be affected by sexual talk, such as sexual wellbeing.
- Should continue to include
 GSD couples in their
 sample to conduct a more
 robust analysis of potential
 difference.



So, what does all of this mean?

Women may be reporting more mutualistic talk than men because women are more likely to remember sexual talk focusing on intimacy, consistent with gendered roles in sexual script.
